





VETERAN OF THE YEAR


FREDERICK W. SMITH

WASHINGTON, D.C.

Frederick Smith founded the multibillion-dollar shipping company FedEx, was enshrined in the Business and Aviation Halls of Fame, earned a Silver Star, and has been dubbed one of the greatest living business minds worldwide.

But he says the most meaningful honor he received was when his Marines dug a hole for him.

"When I was a company commander in Vietnam ... I had to go up and talk to the colonel nearly every day, while my troops were setting into positions, digging their fighting holes," Smith said. "And I'd dig my hole when I came back."



"One night I came back and my troops had dug my fighting hole for me. They were as tired or more tired, but they took their energy to take care of me. And it was one of the best things that ever happened to me, because it told me they cared for me, they appreciated my leadership."

Smith has long insisted he learned more about corporate success from his three years in the Marine Corps than his time at Yale Business School. The 79-year-old entrepreneur said college helped him learn how companies work. The military taught him how people work.

His time in the military included a tour in Vietnam punctuated by a Silver Star award for heroism in May 1968. During a search and destroy operation, the young first lieutenant rushed through incoming fire to direct counterattacks and overtake enemy defensive positions.

Smith was wounded twice during his time in country and also earned a Bronze Star. He also lost six friends during the war, a burden he says he carries with him daily.

While growing FedEx from a small aircraft maintenance company to one of the world's largest transportation firms, he was also involved in numerous philanthropic efforts, many with military ties.

He served as co-chairman of both the U.S. World War II Memorial project and the campaign for the National Museum of the Marine Corps, helping raise money and public support for both locations.

"As I've gotten older and look back, I realize how defining my time in the Marine Corps was to my whole life, and it makes me want to give back," he said.

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SOLDIER OF THE YEAR

SGT. 1ST CLASS **ELIZABETH MARKS**

FT. CARSON, CO

Before the medals, before finding purpose in the pool and the platform for advocacy it offered, before the injuries, before there was a Sqt. 1st Class Elizabeth Marks, there was Ellie — a girl who grew up surrounded by "100 grandparents who had all served in the military," exposure courtesy of a father — a Marine and Vietnam veteran — who worked maintenance at a Veterans Affairs hospital.

Marks, Military Times' 2024 Soldier of the Year, joined the Army in 2008 as a combat medic. After being injured in

Iraq in 2010, she was sent to Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. There, she found her road to recovery. "I found so much more than swimming," she said. "I got to dictate my own pain and push as hard as I wanted."

Swimming provided a path to stay in uniform and led to adaptive events like the Warrior Games and, later, Paralympic competitions and opportunities to mentor fellow service members. It was never awards or recognition that motivated Marks, but the chance to set an example. "The only reason I became or have stayed a swimmer or stayed in the military wasn't because of medals and accolades," Marks said. "It was because of my brothers and sisters in the military and my hope that they could be afforded opportunity and support."

In 2012, after being declared fit for duty, Marks joined the Army's World Class Athlete Program to pursue competitive swimming full-time while in uniform. In 2016, Marks won gold at the Rio de Janeiro Summer Paralympic Games, setting a world record for her classification in the 100-meter breaststroke. She also took home bronze in a medley relay, ESPN recognized her with the Pat Tillman Award for Service that same year.

Less than a year later, chronic pain and complications from injuries necessitated the amputation of Marks' left leg below the knee. Then it was back to the pool. While competing in the rescheduled 2020 Tokyo Summer Paralympic Games, Marks won gold in the 100-meter backstroke, silver in the 50-meter freestyle, and bronze in the 50-meter butterfly.

Marks is far from done and considered a favorite to qualify for the 2024 Paris Paralympic Games. Such pursuits are inherently tied to ensuring those in uniform know they always have someone in their corner. "I just want more service members to pursue adaptive sports," she said. "My dream is to help them get there."

MARINE OF THE YEAR

COL. NICOLE MANN

HOUSTON - NASA


As a child growing up, Marine Col. Nicole Mann would look at the stars and wonder if she could ever explore them herself. "It seemed like some far, far distant thing that other people got a chance to do," she recalled.

In 2022, Mann got that chance.

As a NASA astronaut, she led a multinational team into space for a nearly six-month stay aboard the International Space Station.

Mann, Military Times' 2024 Marine of the Year, received her commission from the Naval Academy in 1999, and

became an F/A-18 pilot. She flew 47 combat missions in Iraq and Afghanistan and then served as a test pilot. She has accrued more than 2,700 flight hours in 25 types of aircraft.



But it didn't go as planned at first.

She and Koichi Wakata of Japan exited the station on Jan. 20, 2023, to install a support structure for a new solar array. During their first spacewalk, they were installing the final strut on the structure when they faced mechanical interference. After nearly seven and a half hours, they had to return inside the station.

They tried again on Feb. 2, 2023, and after six and a half hours, the pair managed to install that strut. "I remember feeling so frustrated and so disappointed when we came back in the door that first time not accomplishing the mission, and then so proud and so absolutely amazed by the teamwork of everybody on the ground to overcome that obstacle," Mann said.

In March 2023, the Endurance splashed down off the Florida coast.

The trip beyond Earth made Mann, who is registered with the Wailacki of the Round Valley Indian Tribes, the first Native American woman in space.


"As a kid, you should dream," she said. "If you want to explore, if you want to go to the stars, that's something that's within your reach."





SAILOR OF THE YEAR

PERSONNEL SPECIALIST 1ST CLASS ALEXANDER BOSTON

JACKSONVILLE, FL

It takes all the sailors onboard to operate a U.S. Navy warship. And in the Middle East wartime environment that the destroyer Carney has found itself operating since October, every role becomes doubly important.

In such environments, some sailors make an impact in their day job and behind the scenes, serving as the quiet glue that keeps a ship's crew together. To hear his command tell it, Personnel Specialist 1st Class Alexander Boston exemplifies this ethos, and for that reason he is the Military Times' 2024 Sailor of the Year.



By his own admission, the married father's job isn't the flashiest. He attends to the human resources needs of hundreds of Carney sailors, making sure their pay and benefits are squared away. Such a job is always important in a unit, but the Carney isn't just any old ship at sea these days.

Since Oct. 19, it has shot down an at-times relentless barrage of missiles and air attack drones fired by Iran-backed Houthi rebels in Yemen. Boston works to help ensure they stay focused on that fight. "I may not be shooting Tomahawks and different things like that and armoring up, but ... as long as I know that their families and/or them don't have to worry about that and they can concentrate on their job, that makes me happy," he said.

A steady, light presence, Boston backs up his crewmates at every turn. "He helps them take care of any issues back home that may cause undue stress, to keep them locked in and positive," Cmdr. Jeremy Robertson, Carney's commanding officer, said of Boston.

A Barstow, Florida, native, the 39-year-old played football for Florida State University and earned a bachelor's degree in science. After a stint with the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars, Boston enlisted in 2010.

"He is never overwhelmed, and he keeps a positive attitude through even the most difficult situations," Chief Personnel Specialist Wesley Taylor, Boston's direct supervisor, said in a statement.

Boston doesn't hide the affection he feels for Carney's crew as they continue their historic deployment. "They are some resilient young men and women," he said. "I look at them daily, and that's why I like joking, having a good time with all of them and trying to make their day better."

AIRMAN OF THE YEAR

SENIOR AIRMAN

KOSTIANTYN KHYMCHENKO

LANGLEY - EUSTIS AFB, HAMPTON, VA

Senior Airman Kostiantyn "KK" Khymchenko barely spoke a word of English when he arrived in the U.S. from Ukraine in 2019.

Though his official role is that of a heating, ventilation and air conditioning journeyman with the 633rd Civil Engineer Squadron at Joint Base Langley-Eustis, Virginia, Khymchenko has doubled as a translator during multiple deployments since Russia invaded Ukraine in early 2022.

In February 2022, the 32-year-old airman agreed to a last-minute deployment to Ramstein Air Base, Germany.



Details about his work remain classified. But for Khymchenko — a native of the city of Konotop in northern Ukraine — the stakes of serving both his homeland and his adopted nation were high. "This was [a] big stress, because I [was] scared to be wrong," he said. "I hope my translations helped to save somebody's [life]."

Khymchenko arrived in Utah after his wife received a green card in 2019. He spent his first several months in America working as a mechanic and enlisted in the Air Force in early 2020.

A graduate of the Ukrainian Academy of Customs, Khymchenko worked as a border patrol agent in Crimea, which Russia illegally annexed in 2014, and in Russia's Kursk region. That experience prepared him well for his first Air Force deployment, said retired Col. Rob Swertfager, who directed the California National Guard's State Partnership Program with Ukraine.

Khymchenko's dedication was immediately apparent, and his professionalism and talent "far exceeded his rank," Swertfager said. He'd arrive to work early and stay late, translating essential information, adding context to conversations and building trust with Ukrainian counterparts.

On his second deployment, to Saudi Arabia in 2023, Khymchenko was again sent to Germany to translate during U.S.-led training of Ukrainian special forces.

Since then, he's set his sights on becoming a commissioned officer, perhaps to fly rescue or intelligence aircraft. "America gives my family everything we need," Khymchenko said. "I want to serve and protect this country."




COLORADO SPRINGS - PETERSON

Last fall, a Space Force guardian went where no one from the newest military branch had gone before: Army Ranger School.

In October, Space Force Capt. Daniel Reynolds became the first in his service to graduate from the training program. That accomplishment earned Reynolds Military Times' 2024 Guardian of the Year award. "When I first arrived at Ranger School, I was nervous," Reynolds, 29, told Military Times. "But what I also realized, as I checked in, was that everyone around me was feeling the exact same way."

COAST GUARDSMAN OF THE YEAR

Last year, as high winds swept across the Pacific Ocean and battered Maui, Petty Officer 1st Class Matthew Casper was at his team's small rescue station on Mā'alaea Bay when he got the call. A devastating wildfire was spreading and residents of the nearby town of Lahaina were fleeing to the harbor.

For four days, beginning on Aug. 8, Casper directed his crew of Coast Guardsmen in their lone 45-foot-boat as they assisted in the rescue of dozens of people. For his actions, he has been named Military Times' 2024 Coast Guardsman of the Year.

Despite their experience and training, the rescue boat crew were nervous as they prepared to head to the harbor. Then Petty Officer 2nd Class Teddy Kirkbride heard Casper on a call with higher command, telling them they needed a safety waiver due to the conditions, but that his team was ready.

"We've got the best crew members at Maui, the best engineer and two of the best coxswains standing by," Casper said.

"Just hearing him say that ... helped my confidence going out there and doing the hard thing," Kirkbride said.

The crew made it to the harbor, weaving through unmoored boats, dead bodies and thick smoke. Over the next six hours, the crew would hear from Casper, checking in on them, advising them and running interference from the cascade of radio traffic flooding the airwaves.

They hauled people off stranded boats, they threw lines to a jetty wall that survivors used to pull themselves to the boat, they picked up people who swam out to meet them to escape the smoke and flames. Casper recalled the rest of the station's personnel, rotating teams nonstop to the harbor.

By sunrise the next day, the station crew had run nonstop shifts to the harbor and saved 17 people. In total, they would go on to rescue 40 people over four days. The fires killed at least 100 people and caused nearly \$6 billion in damage, devastating Maui.

Casper was the calm voice amid the storm, connecting the crew with those in need throughout those harrowing days. "I've never been more proud to be part of a group of men and women in my life," Casper said. "It's really an honor to be a part of that."

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


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
